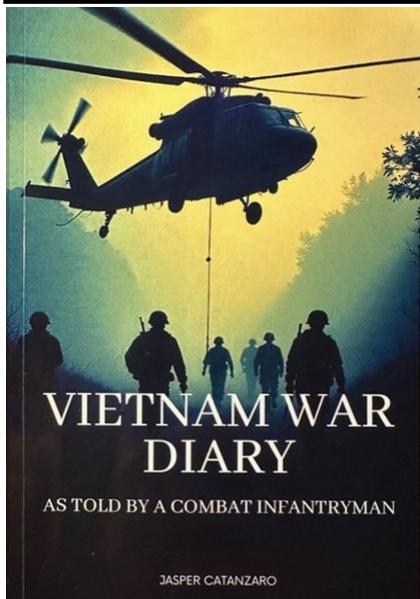

Vietnam War Diary As Told By A Combat Infantryman by Jasper Catanzaro



This is a first-hand account of a war the U.S. should not have entered. It is easy to read from the first page to the last, and gives some history of Vietnam and the ignored warning signs. It is written by a combat infantryman, or "grunt," in the 5th Battalion 7th Cavalry, a battalion formed to join the other battalions of the 1st Cavalry Division's airmobile operations.

He, along with a core group of soldiers who trained together for over eight months, was sent to Vietnam in August 1966, a "band of brothers" mostly made up of draftees. Over the next year, the unit saw numerous encounters with both the Viet Cong and North Vietnamese Army. In one battle, his company was literally wiped out. The bravery of these soldiers was shown by the numerous awards given to them, including one Medal of Honor winner.

Reading through the daily accounts, you will see why the 1968 TET offensive occurred, given what happened in 1967. You will read about the bravery of soldiers fighting for a country that didn't want them there. You'll read about the daily movements of soldiers from one firebase to another, using these soldiers as bait to draw out the Viet Cong and the North Vietnamese Army in hopes of winning by attrition, or what was known as "body count."

So, take a walk in a grunt's boots as you journey through the pages of this diary.

Care to guess what happened next? Yep, no pies or desserts of any kind were left for our own Troopers. Needless to say, they were pleasantly pissed off and any hint of holiday spirit went out the new DFAC doors with the Iraqis.

Within the next two days, a couple of Troopers decided that "Operation Iraqi Pie" needed to happen and ASAP! Later that night around the 26th of December, the new DFAC was mysteriously consumed in flames. Our approximate 10 days of DFAC access was no more. I guess the Troopers figured if they couldn't have pie, no one could have pie. Moral of the story, don't set out all your pies for the purpose of military customs and courtesy, especially around Christmas when deployed. Enjoy your holiday pies this season and Merry Christmas ☺☺."

JERRY TAYLOR VETERANS PLAZA The Jerry Taylor Veterans Plaza in Sunnyside, Wash.; has blossomed into one of the largest memorials for veterans in the Northwest since its first two walls were installed in 2014. Spearheaded by past **VFW Post 3482 Commander Greg Schlieve**, the Jerry Taylor Veterans Plaza is now halfway complete, with 22 of its projected 42 granite walls installed, each engraved with plaques of veterans from the northwest part of the country.

"It is very important to us that individual soldiers be recognized for their service to our country," said Schlieve, a Vietnam War veteran who deployed in 1969 with C Co., 5th Bn., 7th Cav., 1st Cav. Div.

Schlieve, who overlooks the project, added that the goal is to install two walls every year to honor more and more veterans. Each year, he collects orders from local veterans and families who want to order plaques for them-selves or their loved ones.

Each year, the new walls are unveiled in a special ceremony that Schlieve, along with Post 3482 and his Legion Post 73, coordinate and run along-side the town of Sunnyside for those in attendance.

"Our Post's Honor Guard is there, and we ring the bell as names are read off at the end of the ceremony, along with the wife of one of our members' wives who played "Taps" for us," Schlieve said. "It is a special ceremony."
